1. Minutes	1.1 The committee reviewed October 14, 2015 minutes	1.1 Minutes approved with minor revisions to 8.5 Discussion and 6.1 Outcome
2. SSSP Plan Update/ Allocations	2.1 SSSP Plan has been approved by Academic Senate. Plan is due this Friday with budget, but Mt. SAC did not receive allocations from Chancellor's Office. President's Advisory Cabinet will not review until next Tuesday. An extension has been granted. Mt. SAC's allocations will be approximately \$6.9 million. Last year's allocation was approximately \$2.9 million. This year, the Chancellor's Office will use the 2015-16 formula to calculate allocations. 2.2 A question was asked about how faculty members can have input on discussions regarding SSSP Funds. L. DeLeon reported there is currently no process for requesting funds, but provided copies of a document titled "Comparison: SSSP and Student Equity – Revised for 2015-16" outlining allocation requirements and limitations. SSSP funds can be used for "core services" only. J. Ocampo commented that since SSSPAC is involved in review and	2.2 SSSPAC members would like clarification on how this advisory committee can be included in SSSP fund allocation discussions and recommendations

	or counseling/faculty collaborative workshops.

	or TOEFL (450 minimum) scores. All international	
	students are given the AWE and Compass at	
	orientation. T. Mauch suggested having conversation	
	with the international student counselors to identify	
	those students in class who did not pass the Compass	
	for AmLa placement. Since F1 students are allowed	
	to enter in the lowest level credit course, students	
	may be registering for this course who are	
	underprepared. The Course Catalogue lists a	

	Compass cut score for the AmLa reading course.	
4. Multiple Measures – Student Success Inventory Summary Report	4.1 J. Ocampo asked if more information was needed from Nico Martinez regarding the number of total units students self-report on the multiple measure questions, and if the question needs to be reworded. Discussion followed noting students who are "exempt" from assessment who may elect to participate in order to receive "priority registration." These students may already have degrees that could possibly skew the range of scores.	4.1 Multiple Measure Question #5 (tota units) will be re-worded during the next meeting

6. Department Updates	 6.1 AWE: S. Ezzell reported that the new AWE readers have been trained and have started reading essays. 6.2 Learning Assistance: D. Rowley shared feedback from faculty who attended the Developmental Education Study Team (DEST) Parachutes & Ladders Fall Follow-up (Best Teaching Practices) in Founders Hall. Various student groups (Forensics Team Students, Author's Chair Students, and Honors Students) shared engaging, critical thinking assignments with faculty and discussed how these types of assignments impacted their learning. Also, librarians Hong Guo and Chisa Uyeki presented research tools for faculty, and Grace Hanson and Julie Bradley from DSP&S presented on implementing Universal Design in classrooms. 6.3 Counseling: A. Lujan shared plans for a pilot project to change orientation to include English, math, AmLa, and Learning Assistance faculty. 6.4 Continuing Ed./ESL: Since non- credit has a 50% turnover of population, there was discussion on how best to capture Ed Plans from student so they will have an idea where to go after ESL classes. The SSSP Plan requires a plan/goal for students; however for 	

state wants 100% of non-credit students to have goals, but each student is allowed only one comprehensive plan. D.
