
Tips On How to Talk with Your Professors?



Why is Communicating With Your Professors Important

- They can get to know you and it can make a difference in your final grade


How and When Should You Communicate With Your Professors

- Start right away; possibly the first day of class, make a connection
- Take note of office hours noted on the syllabus. Office hours are set times for student to meet with the professor after class--call or stop by
- Make arrangements or schedule an appointment time with professor if you can't make scheduled office hours
- Email is usually the easiest and quickest way to communicate with your professors.
- Meet with Professors before or after class



Questions to Ask

- Anything to do with the class that isn't already in the syllabus
- Anything pertaining to the lectures and learning process of the class
- Feed back on graded assignments and tests
- When you are unclear of what the assignment is asking for
- Recommendations on extracurricular activities and information
- Letters of recommendation
- Questions on careers related to class subject
- Questions on why they chose their career path
